Greetings brethren, family, and friends.

The second half of the year is coming to a close. Here are the highlights of our work during this time.

OUTREACH

BAPTISMS

Did you notice the plural? It is always great to report a single conversion, but being able to report on two is really exciting.

The first is clearly close to my heart. On the 9th of Sept. our oldest daughter CHLOE made the biggest decision of her life to take on the Christian walk. This might be considered a natural progression for one who has grown up in a church environment, and in some ways that is true. Chloe had heard the gospel preached numerous times, had attended lots of Bible classes, and even came with me on several studies with non-Christians; so the knowledge and belief was certainly present. Yet often what is "naturally expected" can be challenging to bring into reality, not to mention the transition into a new level of scrutiny. All that said, we are glad Chloe waited to make sure she was ready and that it was her choice. We are very happy parents.

The immersion itself was unique in that it took Chloe about 20 mins to psyche herself up to go under the cold water, and she is the first person I know to be baptized while wearing thick woollen socks ©.





A young man named ROHAN is our newest brother in Christ. The Neall family provide accommodation for overseas students and this is how they met Rohan who is

from India and is going to university here in Palmy. He was happy to come along to various church activities, and during one of those I was able to initiate a religious discussion with him. Rohan said he was very interested in looking into the Bible, so we started having regular studies together. He had lots of good questions throughout, and though his family background is steeped in Hinduism, he was soon willing to accept that Christianity is the superior authority for his life. When he learned what he needed to do to obey the gospel he wanted to take some time to think over the commitment. After a week of "counting the cost" Rohan stated that he couldn't get it out of his mind and that he "had to go through with it." On the 19th of Nov. we got the job done.









STUDIES

Though somewhat sporadic, the Bible studies with the former Mormon, <u>Leon</u>, continue. We have covered a wide variety of topics, and while challenging for both of us, the discussion has been very cordial.

Sophie de Thierry & I completed our studies with $\underline{\mathrm{Tai}}$ in Masterton. Despite assurances that perfection and full understanding of all things biblical aren't required, she still felt she wasn't ready to take the final step into Christ. The ball is in Tai's court, so unless I hear anything sooner I'll contact her again in a few months.

Our oldest son <u>Ethan</u> also expressed his interest to start studying. We have begun at square one by looking at evidences for God, Jesus, the Bible's inspiration, etc. It's not that he disbelieves in these things, but we both agreed that building a solid platform of foundational things would be the best way to progress.



An exciting outreach instruction initiative has been developed by Lance Mosher & John Jones called the *Making Disciples Training Program.* It really stresses the

importance of every day evangelism and creating & making use of opportunities for sharing our faith through the means of employing a simple but effective conversational approach. Eight members of our congregation and one from the Foxton congregation took part in the 10 week course running from October to early December. During this period the class engaged in 116 religious conversations, set Bible studies with 18 individuals, and conducted 18 Bible study appointments.

I am hoping the new found confidence developed within these fine brothers & sisters will truly pay future dividends in the form of continued "seed sowing," other brethren being motivated by their example, and the church increasing in number.

If you or your congregation could use an evangelistic boost, then I strongly recommend this course. We all have a responsibility to try and win others to Christ and the *Making Disciples Training Program* will provide the kick-start and skills to do so.
