19 Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age. "ESV

The Patience of a Farmer

James 5:7 Be patient, then, brothers, until the Lord's coming. See how the farmer waits for the land to yield its valuable crop and how patient he is for the autumn and spring rains.

Autumn is such a pleasure after a long hot summer. Especially enjoyable is to watch the crops being harvested. A few months ago the corn was planted. A simple little sprout pops through the ground and then grows to at least knee high by the fourth of July. It then tassels and sets ears. Finally the ears begin to dry and the once dark green plant becomes dry and brown. The corn pickers arrive into the fields and the harvest is collected. The process even with all the modern day equipment takes around seven months. Running the corn picker in July would destroy the crop. Waiting to fertilize in September would be a waste of money. The farmer must follow the proved process and wait. He has no control over the weather but must instead wait patiently for the rains to fall. When all falls into place and the harvest is completed, then the spring investment pays off.

James, using the example of the farmer, calls upon God's people to be patient. Christians are waiting for their harvest day as well. Years of living the life can pass before the crown of life is received. The Lord's Day is coming but much work and possibly many hardships must take place before the day arrives. In the next verse James wrote, "You too, be patient and stand firm, because the Lord's coming is near." Much can happen during the course of a life time but we are to remain faithful knowing the reward is to come at the right time. Far more beautiful than the harvest of crops is an aged Christian that has given years and years of service and completes life faithful to the end. Are you patiently serving God, waiting for him to send the spring and autumn rains and waiting for the harvest?
